We have been in discussions with Dental Health Services Victoria for a visiting dental van for public clients. Hopefully, we will get some good news in the next financial year's budget.

Allied Health Manager, Rhonda Slater, has been liaising with Hearing Connect to re-start their service at both campuses, to ensure our community has access to hearing tests locally. More information soon on this one.

#### **BOARD MATTERS**

The BSHS Board of Directors held their monthly meeting on Wednesday 23 March at 6:30pm. These meetings continue to be held by Zoom and are likely to continue this way for some months ahead.

There was a lengthy discussion regarding two proposed capital works projects at Beaufort, comprising of three additional ensuites in the acute ward and the construction of a maintenance workshop and storage facility. The Board endorsed the recommendation of the Project Control Group to engage Searle Bros to undertake this project. Work should commence towards the end of April. Searle Bros were chosen on the basis of their tender and also their familiarity with the Beaufort Campus after having recently completed the major refurbishment of the Nursing Home.

The Board noted a report regarding a presentation at the Beaufort Urgent Care Centre by a man suffering from multiple bee stings. While this would be an unusual and serious case there has been very positive feedback that the Urgent Care team did an amazing job in stabilizing the patient and preparing him for transfer to Ballarat Health Service. Our congratulations to the Urgent Care team for their quick and professional care of this patient.

Following some concerns regarding pressure injuries at the Beaufort Campus last year, it is pleasing to note that the strategies implemented at the time have been successful. The Beaufort clinical team recently celebrated '100 consecutive days of no pressure injuries'. A big well done from the Board on this excellent outcome.

The Directors considered a request from the Department of Health for CEO, Meryn to be seconded for a few weeks to support another rural health service currently experiencing some significant challenges in meeting standards and maintaining programs. The Directors agreed to this request and suitable backfill arrangements will be implemented by the Executive team during the two to four weeks of Meryn's secondment. It is clear that Meryn's skills and experience are well regarded by the Department of Health and our agreement to support this arrangement will build on the already existing strong relationship between BSHS and the Department.

On behalf of the Board I would like to thank management and staff for their ongoing good work in providing quality services to the communities of Beaufort and Skipton.

Pet therapy involves treatment through a guided animal interaction to improve physical, mental or social health.


#### Why pet therapy?



# MINI CRUSTLESS CHICKEN QUICHES

Recipe

#### **Ingredients**

Olive oil

8 eggs

150ml reduced-fat milk

Pinch of salt

150g cooked chicken, diced

75g mushrooms, sliced

75g capsicum, diced

1/2 cup frozen peas

1/2 cup corn kernels

6 cherry tomatoes, halved

100g reduced-fat cheddar cheese, grated

#### Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 200°C. Spray a 12-hole muffin tray with olive oil
- 2. In a large jug, beat the eggs, milk and a pinch of salt together
- 3. in the bottom of each muffin hold, place some chicken, mushrooms, capsicum, peas and corn
- 4. Pour in the egg mixture and top with half a tomato and cheese
- 5. Bake for 25-30 minutes or until golden

# **OMICRON VARIANT, WINTER DOSE, 5-11 YEAR OLDS**

Latest wastewater testing results have shown that the BA.2 Omicron variant has been detected in all Victorian wastewater catchments.

A reminder to our community and families that the best way to protect yourself during this time, is to have your COVID-19 third dose vaccination if you are aged 16 and over and had your second dose three or more months ago.

It was announced at the end of last month that selected cohorts at greatest risk of severe illness from COVID-19 can now receive a winter dose of the COVID-19 vaccine to increase protection before winter.



- · Aged care and disability care residents
- Severely immunocompromised aged 16 and over
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders aged 50 and over
