OUR BUSINESS JUNE 2023

Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission re-accreditation of Ripon Peace and Delama, Residential Aged Care Beaufort was conducted with three Assessors from 30 May - 2 June 2023. Overall, the Assessors were complimentary about the care provided by staff and advised that there were no gaps across the eight standards. We now await the formal report.

I am please to advise that we have been successful with a grant application for the development of a new garden at Ripon Peace and to create kitchen gardens at Delama and Brigadoon, The total value of the grants is \$62,000. Congratulations to Kel on your submission.

The BSHS Board of Directors held its monthly meeting on Wednesday 24 May 2023 with all Directors in attendance. The Board received a report from one of our Home Care Package recipients who was very complimentary regarding her experience as a client of BSHS and confirmed that she was very happy with her Case Manager and services provider.

OUR BUSINESS JUNE 2023

Once again a good example of the positive impact our services have on the quality of life of our consumers.

A highlight of the meeting was a presentation by Emma Leehane on the history of First Nations People in Australia. Emma is the Aboriginal Health Liaison Officer with Grampians Health Service and supports BSHS on a part time basis in supporting the cultural diversity of our Health Service. The presentation was very interesting and left us all better informed on the culture and family structures that underpin Aboriginal society. She also outlined the work that is being undertaken by Governments at all levels in closing the gap between First Nations People and other Australians.

Advice has been received from the Department of Health that the BSHS proposal within the GP's in Community Health Services Program has been approved and will be funded for the next two years. Well done Mary for the work in preparing the project brief.

Following our recent submission to the BSHS Foundation we can now confirm that funding has been provided for the purchase of ten recliner lift chairs and two End of Life trolleys. The Directors are appreciative of this significant contribution from the Foundation and look forward to their continuing support.

The Directors and Management have commenced the process of developing a new five year Strategic Plan for the Health Service. Following consultation with the Leadership team and feedback from the most recent Community Health Needs Survey it is proposed to have a draft plan ready for consideration in early August.

Finally and on behalf of the Board can I thank both management and staff for the important work of providing quality healthcare to our communities.

NEW NAMES FOR HEALTH SERVICE FACILITIES

CEO Meryn Pease and Board of Directors Chair, David Lenehan announced recently that two of Beaufort's significant facilities would undergo name changes.

The announcement was made to staff and residents detailing that two of the Health Services facilities were to be considered for name changes and their input would be valued. Board Chair, David Lenehan said, "It is both timely and important that the buildings names reflect the values and culture of the local community." "The Beaufort Nursing Home and Beaufort Hostel have been considered for a name change for quite some time now as it was generally felt the previous names were no longer relevant and did not reflect the type of communities that they currently serve", he added.

The decision to rename the facilities was made after extensive consultation with the staff, residents, community representatives and local traditional owners, the Wadawurrung. "The renaming process was undertaken with a focus of inclusiveness and cultural reflection", Ms Pease said.

The consultation and research process was conducted by the Health Service with thought that the new names should reflect both the local area and the values of the community. 'Ripon Peace' has been chosen for the Beaufort Nursing Home with "Ripon" referencing both the historical and local electorate and with reference to the original name of "Ripon Peace Memorial Hospital".

The Beaufort Hostel has been renamed 'Delama', from the Indigenous term meaning "to embrace". The name reflecting the desire to create a welcoming and inclusive environment for residents and their families.

"The Health Service hopes the new names will reflect the level of importance that the facilities hold for the community, both through cultural diversity and values", David Lenehan added. We expect new signage at the respective buildings will be installed in the near future.

Clients are able to choose different providers for the different services that they need, as they are not locked in with one provider, if that is their choice. 2023 PEOPLE MATTER SURVEY

The People Matter Survey is an annual employee opinion survey that is run independently of BSHS, by the Victorian Public Sector Commission. This year's survey asks for your experience about different aspects of your workplace, including workplace culture, manager support, leadership, equal employment opportunity and wellbeing. It is relevant to all employees regardless of where and how you work, including on the frontline.

You'll also be asked a range of demographic questions about yourself, such as your age, gender and cultural background. These questions are designed to gather information about our workforce to help foster diversity and inclusion. This can include how we support equal opportunity, reduce discrimination and promote fairer recruitment.

What's new for 2023?

You'll see new questions developed in consultation with the Public Sector Gender Equality Commissioner to support the <u>Gender Equality Act 2020 audit and reporting requirements.</u>
You will be able to access the survey from a desktop or mobile device. The survey will take about 15 minutes to complete.

Your privacy and anonymity are protected

The survey is completely anonymous, and we do not see your completed survey responses.

The <u>Victorian Public Sector Commission</u> runs the independent survey and uses strict rules to protect your privacy and anonymity at every stage of the survey.

To protect you, they:

- Use an anonymous survey link and everyone in our organisation receives the same survey link.
- De-identify individual survey responses. This means our organisation can't identify individuals when the data is reported.
- Don't collect identifying information such as name, date of birth or employee ID
- Separate open-text responses from other data. Our organisation won't know where the comments came from or who made them.
- Don't release team or demographic group results when there are fewer than 10 responses.

You have the option to respond to demographic questions, such as age or gender, with 'prefer not to say'. All information is handled in line with Victorian and Commonwealth law.

The survey will be open from Monday 29 May until Friday 23 June 2023

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Raspberry Bliss Balls

INGREDIENTS

1 tbs Macro white chia seeds
1 cup desiccated coconut
1/2 cup traditional rolled oats
1/2 cup almond butter
1/4 cup raisins
1 lemon, zested
12 fresh raspberries



METHOD

- 1. Combine chia seeds a 2 tbs water in a small bowl. Set aside for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally, or until mixture has thickened.
- 2. Place 3/4 cup coconut, oats, butter, raisins, zest and chia mixture in a food processor. process for 15 seconds or until mixture is smooth and starts to clump.
- 3. Place remaining coconut on a plate. Using hands, roll 1 tbs mixture into a ball and flatten to make a disc. Place 1 raspberry in centre of disc and wrap mixture around raspberry to form a ball. Roll ball in coconut. Repeat.

MY HEALTH RECORD IN AGED CARE

Beaufort and Skipton Health Service is in the process of implementing access for Registered Nurses in Clinical Manager (our documentation system) to My Health Record (MHR) in our Aged Care Residential Services. MHR is a Federal Government initiative to enable all Australian's to keep an online summary of their key health information.

The advantage of having access for Residential Aged Care is that through the My Health Record system, Registered Nurses who have completed the necessary training can access timely information about residents, such as shared health summaries, discharge summaries, prescription and dispensing records, pathology reports and diagnostic imaging reports. This improves continuity of care and can save time in an emergency.
